The first graduating class was the Class of 2004. Since 2004, 100% of UA graduates have been accepted to college. Over the years, UA has been fortunate to earn many accolades, but no school is perfect. We are proud of our past, but focused on our future as we look to continuously improve. We want to thank our founders, Shirley Bush Helzberg, Barnett Helzberg, Tom Bloch, and Lynne Brown, for setting a vision and making UA become a reality. We also want to thank all the students, parents and staff members over the years who have built this legacy.

DEAR UNIVERSITY ACADEMY COMMUNITY,

It goes without saying the 2019-2020 school year has been like no other. The perseverance and fortitude of teachers, staff, parents, and students in the face of the unknown has been remarkable. Under extraordinary circumstances, with a clear mission guiding all work, you remained true to UA's core values of educating our students at the highest level possible.

Through high expectations, University Academy prepares students to succeed in higher education institutions and serve as positive role models and valuable members of the community.

In that spirit, as we worked to pivot to virtual learning in March, there were many "firsts" at UA. We found a way to equip all students with technology for effective remote classroom access through generous donations and swift action of the administration. Teachers found new ways to instruct and collaborate. And, despite the pandemic, UA was able to offer a shortened version of Summer School inperson successfully, with all safety protocols in place. Although it was touch-and-go when shutdowns were imminent, everyone involved worked hard to give students some sense of normalcy over the summer. We were delighted the first-ever Graduation ceremony on the athletic field was a success to honor 50 Seniors from the class of 2020 and congratulate them on their next steps.

The Board also conducted its first virtual meeting in April and worked hard to keep the pace going as things were moving rapidly. The health and safety of the UA community was always at the forefront of our deliberations.

As the world focused on Racial Justice in response to the murders of Breonna Taylor, George Floyd and many more, the Board was intent on passing a resolution condemning violence and racism in support and solidarity. We joined many other public schools in unanimously passing our own Resolution Condemning Violence and Racism in early June of 2020.

This year we added two new board members, Laura Greenbaum and LeRay Warrior '04, and elected Nicole Jacobs-Silvey into a new position on the Board as Vice-Chair. We also said a fond farewell to David Dickey, who served for over 5 years. In the words of Bush Helzberg, "David has always demonstrated the highest level of integrity and commitment to the things he is involved in. When David joined the University Academy board, we had high expectations, and he has more than lived up to them. David and Erika have been extremely generous and have also connected the school with resources that made a number of extraordinary things possible."

The Board was pleased to receive a clean audit report that once again confirmed best practices are being followed, ensuring an accurate financial picture of the organization. As such, we have been fortunate to have strong footing and proactive work happening on behalf of UA. Guiding and accessing funds through proper state and federal avenues to operate at capacity during this unprecedented time has been successful thanks to the hard work of Tony Kline, Tyler Kemp and the Board.

As we look back on 2019-2020 and the many challenges we faced, it is my belief that within those challenges, opportunities grew. A better normal is at our doorstep if we choose to let it enter.

I want to thank the Kauffman Foundation for working with UAF to give students an opportunity to participate in the regional Real World Learning Initiative, which will fundamentally change the opportunities afforded to our students for years to come.

I thank the board of directors for both UA and UAF, who met the challenges of 2020 with steady hands and experience, balancing high expectations and circumstantial realities. Finally, I want to thank supporters. We were able to keep moving forward because of the extra help we received from you. 



UA alumni have college completion rates that are in excess of five times the national average for students from lowest quartile income families. In their careers, UA alumni are contributing to society across industries including business, healthcare, engineering, technology, and the nonprofit sector. The continuously growing Career Acceleration Program, managed by the UA Foundation, supports our alumni's career aspirations with meaningful

internships with local companies of all sizes (both remote and inperson). Additionally, it provides career services including resume reviews and mock interviews to UA alumni who live all over the country. Exciting things are happening, despite the challenges of the current environment.

This is all possible because of the collective commitment and dedication of students, families, faculty, administration, community partners and our amazing community of supporters. Thank you for being there for us in this challenging time. We deeply appreciate your support.

22 Upper School students received scholarships to study abroad in summer of 2020:

Who or what at VA had the greatest impact on where you are today? Why?

Considering the greatest impacts I encountered at UA, I would highly consider my success to both individuals, Coach Damon Paul and Mr. Burdette. During his tenure, Coach Paul not only inspired the entire football team, but instilled the term "Gryphon Pride" into every individual that walked through University Academy. Through his coaching, he was able to demonstrate his teachings while demanding high levels of excellence from his players and our peers. In doing so, he assisted in changing the culture that you now see at UA. Coach Paul assisted me during some of the hardest times of my life and left an imprint on my life that will never be forgotten.

In my opinion, Mr. Burdette is one of the greatest teachers University Academy has had the pleasure of having in their building. I am not sure if he actually remembers this specific moment; however, setting aside time to spend with his family, he graciously put in afterhours to tutor his students allowing us to master our mathematical skills. After a few tutoring sessions, we were able to build a positive rapport with each other and he learned quickly of my love for the game of football. In doing so, he introduced me to Coach Paul and the rest of the coaching staff, which resulted in me not only taking more of his courses, but excelling in his classes, and having a great high school football career. My performance as a student-athlete assisted in gathering multiple collegiate football offers, allowing me to receive my Bachelors degree at Avila University. Even in college, Mr. Burdette was one of my main points of contact regarding assistance with mathematical courses, such as Physics I and II.

How have you utilized the education you received (or the skills you learned) at VA?

The education and skills I received and learned at UA are unmatched. The level of understanding from the education I received at UA helped shape my belief and inspiration into maximizing my potential and further follow my dreams of becoming a future Doctor of Physical Therapy. While at University Academy, a major highlight I can recount was specifically being chosen as one of several participants for 20/20 Leadership to represent our school, while learning networking skills, attending career workshops, building stronger communities, and the ability to showcase our lifelong leadership skills. Experiences such as 20/20 Leadership are not only once in a lifetime memories, but they help students prepare themselves beyond the classroom and well after graduation.

How is your experience at VA impacting you now?

My experiences at UA stand as a true blessing to my life. From the advanced coursework to the University Academy Foundation, I feel immensely indebted to fully use the gifts and tools I learned while at UA. In the Summer of 2013, with University Academy Foundation's partnership, I was given the opportunity to earn a competitive position as one of four Health Sciences Interns at Children's Mercy Hospital. During this system-based observational rotation throughout the hospital system, I was able to network with various health professionals. In doing so, I was able to build a strong rapport with many Physical and Occupational Therapists at Children's Mercy, landing my first full-time healthcare position as a Physical Therapy Aide the following year. With consistent action and hard work, I was able to later return and transfer over to Children's Mercy Sports Medicine Center working alongside our team of orthopedic surgeons, physical therapists, and other medical professionals in the 13,000-square-foot gymnasium consisting of state-of-theart equipment to meet the needs of our athletes that need sports rehabilitation. Due to the gym also being used by Sporting Kansas City and U.S. Soccer, I am also able to network, engage, and learn manual therapeutic techniques from Sporting Kansas City's medical

team as well. I deeply feel that this entire process would have been much more difficult if I did not have the help I received from the University Academy Foundation.

What if you chose to attend a school other than VA? Do you think you would be in the same place?

If I chose to attend any school other than UA, I feel that I would not be in the same position that I am in right now. I believe the reputation that UA holds amongst the community is a sense of pride and admiration towards the school's strength of coursework, the importance of instilling successful habits into their students, and the lifelong impression that the UA Foundation program devotes towards assisting their alumni in achieving their goals.

How has the VA Foundation impacted you and/or where you are today?

The UA Foundation has impacted my life in several ways. The UA Foundation holds the reputation to stand out as a helping hand and assist their alumni in any way possible. Several of the amazing events that the UA Foundation offers include Monday Mixers, Resume Building Workshops, Alumni Career Workshops, Internship Opportunities, Monthly Newsletter Alumni Spotlights, hosting Mock Interviews, serving as a representative for the UA Gala, and etc. I was able to attend all of these listed events and appreciate the sense of care and personalism that our Alumni program has displayed over the years.

What are your goals for the future and who/what has shaped them?

My goal for the future is becoming a Doctor of Physical Therapy (DPT), working with professional athletes to regain independent function and return back to their respective sport, and eventually owning my own Private Practice Physical Therapy/Sports Performance Training facility targeted towards athletes of all ages.
